Godly Play

August marked the beginning of a



wonderful new year in Godly Play. This program invites children into the wonder of story and encourages questions rather than pat answers. Using a Montessori approach with beautiful and tactilely pleasing materials, the storyteller presents a story from the Bible or from church history. Children are invited to consider what they like about the story, why it is

important, and what part they can relate to. They also have time for reflection through art or play.

Godly Play meets from 9:45-10:45 each Sunday. Currently we are gathering in the Godly Play rooms for our story. We are also spending a lot of time outdoors, to reduce contact time and let them take off their masks. (Note that masks are required indoors when CDC levels are High and recommended at Medium.) They children have had a blast running around the playground, getting some of that energy out before Eucharist. When the weather is nice, parents collect their children from the playground rather than the classrooms.

Godly Play 1 is for children 3 years old through 1st grade.



Light and Life By Kathleen Sturgis

Recently we lost a talented performer to cancer. Olivia Newton John brought entertainment to all of us through her music and acting. She suffered from cancer for many years but maintained her positive outlook. Her friend, Dee, said one of the things she will always treasure is the way Olivia would close her letters. She would say, "Light and Life", Olivia. That struck a nerve with me. Why would she choose such a greeting? First I looked at the definitions. Light is something that makes vision possible. A sensation aroused by the visual receptors. Life is any system capable of performing the functions such as eating, metabolizing, excreting. breathing, moving, growing, reproducing and responding to external stimuli. So light arouses the receptors and promotes the sensations of life.

Now let's see what the Bible has to say about these terms. John 1: 4 -5 –"In Him was life and the life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness is dispelled." Light brought energy to the first ecosystems through the process of photosynthesis. The Light of Life transforms lives through the love of Christ by providing food, shelter and hope to men, women and children experiencing homelessness, poverty or addiction. The light is to restore them as healthy members of our community. That is what the CAC ministry is all about.

The scriptures often combine the concept of light with truth. "For the word of the Lord is truth and whatsoever is truth is light and whatsoever is light is Spirit, even the Spirit of Jesus Christ." And, "the Glory of God is intelligence, or in other words, light and truth." God explicitly said that He is indeed light. In the Hindu scriptures, "seeing the light" is equivalent to a spiritual awakening or seeing God.

In John 8:12, Jesus applies the title to himself while debating with the Jews and stated: "I am the light of the world whoever follows Me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." Jesus' light is "the true light of the world " because he is the source of the light which "proceedeth forth from the presence of God to fulfill the immensity of space. " His light is the true light that lightens every man that cometh into the world." So how do we become a Light?

- 1. Be a light in the world and live GLADLY.
- 2. Be a GIFT to others.
- 3. HELP those who are in need of help.
- 4. Be a VOICE for these who believe they no longer have a voice.
- 5. Do no HARM.
- 6. SPEAK no evil.
- 7. Be a LIGHT in this world and JUDGE NO ONE.
- 8. Give FOCUS only to that which is life giving.
- 9. PRAY with all your heart.
- 10. Be a light in this world and honor your TEMPLE.
- 11. NURTURE your soul.
- 12. Find a SACRED CENTER free of loneliness, fear, and feelings of unworthiness.
- 13. Be a light in this dark world and LAUGH a lot.
- 14. DANCE through life.
- 15. Do all things in the name of LOVE.

What other "list " does this remind you of? Yes, the Ten Commandments and the Great Commandment. " Love God and Love one another as yourself." Across cultures, light is an ancient symbol of understanding and intellectual thought.

Dark often is considered frightening and sinister and not understandable. But light conquers darkness and brings order out of chaos. How much we need the

light of truth to illumine our life today. Olivia Newton John seems to have wisdom in her greeting. I plan to use this in my note writing in the future since I realize the strength of the wish. So I will start by wishing each of you.

Greetings from your Altar Guild.

We wish to extend a warm welcome to our new parish members and a continued "thank you" to those who have been around a while. The Altar Guild ministry is open to everyone – including men, as you may have noticed in the weekly bulletin listing those serving each Sunday. Some families like to get involved and

that is certainly encouraged. We like to utilize everyone's particular skills. Some like to polish brass/silver while some like to wash linens for the eucharist. I personally like the satisfaction of seeing the altar setup for the service – everything in its place and ready for the ministers to use during the service.

Like everything else, altar guild service is not for everyone. We welcome you to try it out for a month or two to see if it is as fulfilling for you as it is for those of us currently serving. We promise we will be there to walk you through everything and we utilize checklists, post photographs or diagrams of altar setups and provide manuals to help us all remember what to do.

What type of time commitment is involved? For our regular services we schedule 2 members a Sunday. They usually meet on Sat. morning to polish and get the vessels setup for Sunday. On Sunday morning, one person comes prior to the 8:30am service (around 8:00am) and sets out the prepared items. After that service both members clean what was used and resets for the 11:00am service. After that service the second member cleans and puts everything away. Of course there are special services such as funerals or seasonal services where we all pitch in according to our availability.
