From the Rector: Electing the Next Bishop of Tennessee

As announced earlier this summer, the work of our diocesan Search Committee and Standing Committee did not achieve the goal of presenting a diverse slate of 3 or 4 candidates at that time. This was a disappointment for all concerned. Bp. Bauerschmidt has agreed to serve the diocese a few months longer to ensure a smooth transition.

Nominations were re-opened for a period in July, and applicants are again being reviewed. The slate of nominees will be announced in early

September, followed by an opportunity to nominate candidates by petition September 8-15.

All are invited to meet the finalists and hear them speak at the School of Theology on Saturday, October 17, 2:00-4:00pm. Your convention delegates--Jeannie Babb, Susan Holmes, Beth Wiley, Betty Carpenter, and me, as well as alternates Dorothy Gates, Mary Priestley, and Paul Richaud--will be interested in your thoughts about the candidates.

The electing convention has been delayed to October 24, with additional dates for balloting if needed on November 7 and 14. Please pray that the Holy Spirit will inspire and guide this important process.

My perspective is that it's better to have a good decision than a quick decision, so while the delay is frustrating, it's not as frustrating as forcing an outcome according to the original schedule would have been. I invite you to pray individually the words we are including in the Prayers of the People each Sunday:

Almighty God, giver of every good gift: Look graciously on your Church and pour out your Holy Spirit upon all who will participate in the process of choosing a bishop for this diocese, that we may receive a faithful pastor, who will care for your people and equip us for our ministries; *through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.*

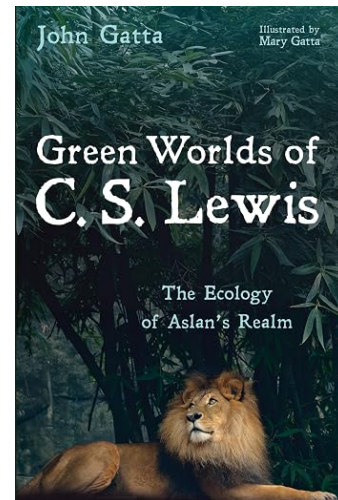

Centering Prayer is a method of silent prayer through which we consent to God's presence and action within us. Those who practice it do so not in place of corporate worship and service, but rather as a necessary complement to those modes of engaging with God and with neighbor. With chairs encircling a candle at the front of the nave, we have a brief check-in about our prayer practice and anything else going on in our lives, and then we have a

Sunday School for All Ages

Sunday School resumes in August, with a sort of rolling start beginning with the youngest age group.

Godly Play 1 is for children aged 3 to 5. The basic Godly Play stories are introduced and considered. Learning is enhanced with art, music, and play. At times, this class will be combined with Godly Play 2.

Godly Play 2 offers children in grades 1-3 an opportunity to learn enrichment lessons and go deeper into the story. This classroom has the same structure as Godly Play 1 – story, wondering, work, feast, and sometimes a romp on the playground.

The Tween Class takes children in grades 4-6 beyond Godly Play. This class meets in Brooks Hall to read and talk about books, applying Scripture to fictional situations and their own lives. The schedule also includes time for food, fellowship, and fun with art, Legos, etc.

Youth Sunday School offers middle schoolers and high schoolers a time to encounter God and get to know one another. This class offers a fresh, relational approach based on teachable moments.

Education for Ministry (EfM), founded by Sewanee's School of Theology over 50 years ago, creates a community of curiosity that supports the exploration and expression of ideas where seminar participants reflect on ways to pursue a daily life of faith. The five core practices—living in community, vocational discernment, prayer and worship, study of Christian tradition, and theological reflection—provide a way to navigate today's complex world with faith, hope, and love while examining life through the lens of journeying with God.

4 steps for EfM registration:

- Participant completes the registration form.
- Mentor confirms everyone is registered.
- EfM creates the cohort in Pathwright.
- Participants receive link to enter Pathwright and pay tuition.

CAC Information

More than a food pantry, the Community Action Committee (CAC) meets the basic human needs of those living in crisis in and around Sewanee. CAC offers neighbors quality food and emergency financial assistance. An outreach ministry of the Parish of St. Mark and St. Paul, CAC seeks to make Christ's love manifest in the world through service, relationship, and dignity.

CAC Keeps Serving Our Neighbors

The CAC food pantry continues to serve our neighbors facing food insecurity on a daily basis. Though it is difficult to see our visits increasing, we remain grateful that neighbors find CAC and choose to turn to us in their time of need. During the first half of the year (January through June), the food pantry provided groceries to 290 unique families supporting 763 individuals. In total, the pantry had 1,416 visits during this period. Though the food pantry has several regular visitors, we also continue to meet new families each month. In the first 6 months, CAC welcomed 119 new families who found themselves in need of our services. The word continues to spread about our food pantry, and we are grateful to be able to provide an array of services to our community.

In addition to serving neighbors through the food pantry, CAC provided utility assistance to 150 neighbors from January to June. This support included partial payments to help offset the costs of electricity, water, and rent, offering relief to households facing financial challenges.

As many know, we partner closely with the Bonner and Canale Program at the University of the South during the academic year, which means we need even more help during the summer months. A Note from your Altar Guild

We wish to extend a warm welcome to our new parish members and a continued "thank you" to those who have been around a while.

The Altar Guild ministry is open to everyone – including men, as you may have noticed in the weekly bulletin listing those serving each

Sunday. Some families like to get involved and that is certainly encouraged. We like to utilize everyone's particular skills. Some like to polish brass/silver while some like to wash linens for the Eucharist. I personally like the satisfaction of seeing the altar setup for the service – everything in its place and ready for the ministers to use during the service.

Like everything else, altar guild service is not for everyone. We welcome you to try it out for a month or two to see if it is as fulfilling for you as it is for those of us currently serving. We promise we will be there to walk you through everything and we utilize checklists, post photographs or diagrams of altar setups and provide manuals to help us all remember what to do.

What type of time commitment is involved? For our regular services we schedule 2 members a Sunday. They usually meet on Sat. morning to polish and get the vessels setup for Sunday. On Sunday morning, one person comes prior to the 8:30am service (around 8:00am) and sets out the prepared items. After that service both members clean what was used and resets for the 11:00am service. After that service the second member cleans and puts everything away. Of course there are special services such as funerals or seasonal services where we all pitch in according to our availability.
