From the Rector: Women in ordained ministry

I have been thinking recently about the gifts women clergy have provided the church. I'll start with some background. In the Episcopal Church, women were first "set apart" as deaconesses in 1855, then

ordained as deaconesses in 1885. The status of deaconesses compared with (male) deacons showed ambiguity and flux over the ensuing decades. In 1970 General Convention combined male and female expressions of the diaconate into the single order of deacons (and accepted lay women as deputies [representatives of their diocese] for the first time).

Summer 2026 will be the 50th anniversary of General Convention's decision to authorize women to be ordained priests and bishops (as well as the first of two required approvals of our current prayer book). A total of 15 women had been ordained priest in 1974 and 1975 before Convention's decision. In 1989, the Diocese of Massachusetts ordained the first woman bishop in the Episcopal Church (and the Anglican Communion).

My own experience intersects with the story here, because my class at the School of Theology (1994) was the first to graduate an equal number of women and men. That same year the Church of England ordained its first women priests. Growth in numbers of female bishops in the Episcopal Church was slow for quite a while; when my diocese at the time (Indianapolis) elected a woman bishop in 1997, there was still a single-digit number of women in the House of Bishops. Katharine Jefferts Schori became Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church in 2006, serving a nine-year term.

Worldwide, 37 of the 41 members of the Anglican Communion ordain women as deacons, 35 ordain women as priests, and 27 in permit women to be ordained as bishops (although 7 of those have yet to do so). A total of five women have been head bishops of their churches, most recently the Most Rev. Sarah Mullaly becoming Archbishop of Canterbury

Current statistics in the Episcopal Church show that 40% of employed clergy are female. The last 10 years have shown a sharp increase in the ordination of women as bishops (including an occasional all-female slate of nominees). Now 36% of active bishops are women. In terms of compensation, female clergy average 89% of what male clergy are paid.

Women have brought gifts to God's service in the church that an all-male clergy would not provide, and help reflect more fully the God who created both male and female in the divine image. Please join me in thanking Betty Carpenter, Kelly Ramer Moody, and their sisters in the ordained ministry of the Episcopal Church for their patience, perseverance, and steadfast love!

Bishop's Visitation

The Rt. Rev. John C. Bauerschmidt will make the final visitation of his episcopate on Sunday, April 19. He will preside and preach at both services, and will administer Confirmation at the 11:00 service. Bp. John will be the speaker at Sunday Forum, and will be present for a reception following the 11am service. As is traditional, offerings for the Bishop's Discretionary Fund will be invited.



Vestry Update:

Regular meeting of March 19, 2026

- Heard from Rob Lamborn about our extra offerings for prayer and learning this Lent, as well as Confirmation Class and Episcopal 101.
- Had reports from CAC, the Finance Committee, the Evangelism Committee, and Junior Warden Chris Asmussen (on the upcoming parish workday), as well as from our SCC liaison.
- Authorized replacing the condensing units and upgrading the heat exchanger coils in two HVAC systems. (These serve the west side of Kennerly Hall, and the Thurmond Library and St. Paul's-on-the-Mountain Chapel). One of the exterior condensing units will be relocated out from under the CAC ramp, where moisture and ice melt chemicals have caused deterioration. The sidewalk at the rear of the building will be re-routed to allow space to relocate the remaining units under the ramp as they are replaced. The Vestry approved payment from capital campaign funds raised for major repair.

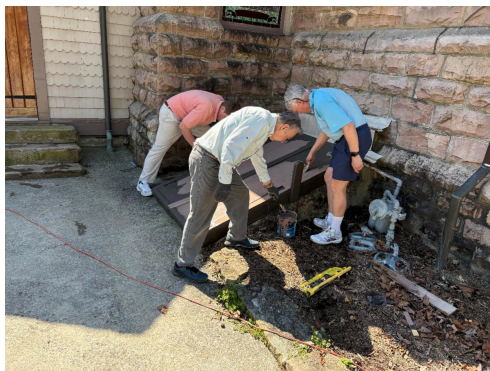


Parish Work (half-)Day

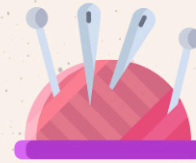

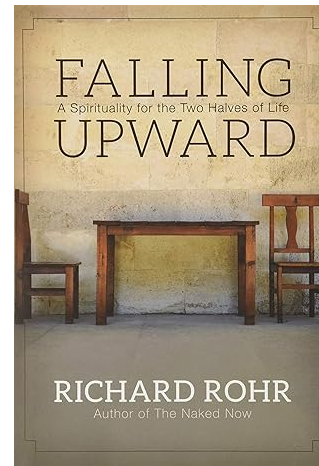

Centering Prayer is a method of silent prayer through which we consent to God's presence and action within us. Those who practice it do so not



in place of corporate worship and service, but rather as a necessary complement to those modes of engaging with God and with neighbor. With chairs encircling a candle at the front of the nave, we have a brief check-in about our prayer practice and anything else going on in our lives, and then we have a meditation session (what we call a "sit") together. Sunday School for All Ages

Additional adult volunteers are needed for our Sunday School classes. All volunteers participate in online training and a background check. Please see Jeannie Babb to find out more.

Godly Play 1 is for children aged 3 to 5. The basic Godly Play stories are introduced and considered. Learning is enhanced with art, music, and play. At times, this class will be combined with Godly Play 2.

Godly Play 2 offers children in grades 1-3 an opportunity to learn enrichment lessons and go deeper into the story. This classroom has the same structure as Godly Play 1 – story, wondering, work, feast, and sometimes a romp on the playground.

4th/5th Class takes children in grades 4 and 5 beyond Godly Play. This class meets in Brooks Hall to read and talk about books, applying Scripture to fictional situations and their own lives. The schedule also includes time for food, fellowship, and fun with art, Legos, etc. The first book for this year is Maniac Magee by Jerry Spinelli. Class leaders are Julia Bates and Matthew Mitchell.

Youth Sunday School offers middle schoolers and high schoolers a time to encounter God and get to know one another. Paul and Andrea Richaud led the class in 2024-2025 with a fresh, relational style based on teachable moments.

CAC Information

The Community Action Committee (CAC) is open Monday through Friday, 9:00 AM to 11:00 AM. Neighbors are able to visit the office during this time to pick out groceries in the pantry and inquire about assistance with utility bills. The work of CAC is not possible without the support of the Parish of St. Mark & St. Paul.

February at the CAC Food Pantry

In February, CAC continued its mission of supporting neighbors in need throughout the community. During the month, the pantry served 117 unique households, representing 298 individuals. Most visits came from

residents of Sewanee, Sherwood, Winchester, Monteagle, and Tracy City.

Overall (including repeat visits), the food pantry distributed food to 201 households, helping feed approximately 554 individuals. CAC welcomed 19 new families during the month of February.

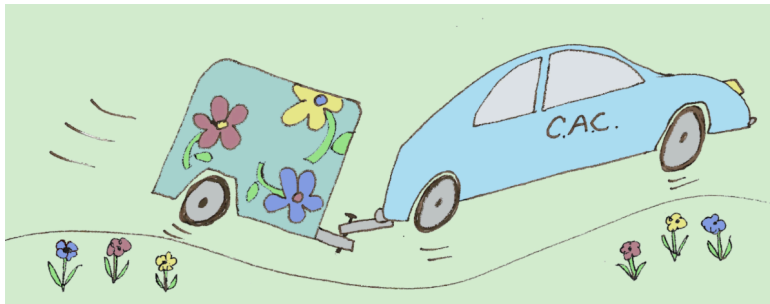

A Note from your Altar Guild

We wish to extend a warm welcome to our new parish members and a continued “thank you” to those who have been around a while.

The Altar Guild ministry is open to everyone – including men, as you

may have noticed in the weekly bulletin listing those serving each Sunday. Some families like to get involved and that is certainly encouraged. We like to utilize everyone’s particular skills. Some like to polish brass/silver while some like to wash linens for the Eucharist. I personally like the satisfaction of seeing the altar setup for the service – everything in its place and ready for the ministers to use during the service.

Like everything else, altar guild service is not for everyone. We welcome you to try it out for a month or two to see if it is as fulfilling for you as it is for those of us currently serving. We promise we will be there to walk you through everything and we utilize checklists, post photographs or diagrams of altar setups and provide manuals to help us all remember what to do.

What type of time commitment is involved? For our regular services we schedule 2 members a Sunday. They usually meet on Sat. morning to polish and get the vessels setup for Sunday. On Sunday morning, one person comes prior to the 8:30am service (around 8:00am) and sets out

the prepared items. After that service both members clean what was used and resets for the 11:00am service. After that service the second member cleans and puts everything away. Of course there are special services such as funerals or seasonal services where we all pitch in according to our availability.
