

From the Senior Warden: Consecration Sunday is coming!

Dear Parishioners of St. Mark and St. Paul-on-the-Mountain,

If you're like me, you sometimes get queasy about our yearly request for a monetary pledge. After all, shouldn't the world of mammon be kept separate from the world of the spirit? Over the years, however, I have come to realize that the money we give to the church is not just a way to pay its bills. Rather, giving can help us grow our relationship with God. It becomes a tangible way of expressing how important our faith is, to us and to the world.

To that end, our parish Stewardship Committee is using the Consecration Sunday program to remind us of the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving. More even than the need of the church to receive is our need to give, which is foundational to our spiritual development. Instead of treating people like members of an organization who should pay dues, our community regards people as followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of

discipleship. Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning services on Consecration Sunday, we will invite members to make their financial commitments to our church's ministries in this community and beyond.

Everyone who completes a pledge card does so voluntarily. The procedure is done in such a way that no one is singled out if choosing not to fill out a card. As we will be doing no home solicitations for pledges, we urge everyone to attend one of the Consecration Sunday services on October 13. Adam Conley will preach the sermon and invite members to make their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

Thanks in advance for your participation in this event, which provides us with the opportunity to reaffirm our commitment to each other and to this community. Regretfully, Julia and I will not be able to join you as we will be teaching in Slovenia, but we will make our own contribution from afar. As we do so, we will reflect on how much you all mean to us.

Vestry Highlights: Regular Meeting of September 19

- --Held an in-depth conversation with Ned Murray on the benefits of having an endowment, and how to structure one.
- --Noted the start of the nomination process for vestry members to be elected at the Annual Parish Meeting November 10.
- --Looked at areas on our leasehold potentially to add parking spaces to make up for the street parking lost along our frontage.

Annual Parish Meeting and Vestry Elections Sunday, November 10, at 9:45am in Kennerly Hall

The Annual Parish Meeting is scheduled for November 10. At this meeting we will be electing three new members to the vestry. Under diocesan canons, "Confirmed Communicants in Good Standing in the Parish sixteen years of age or older may vote at a Parish Meeting, and no proxies shall be allowed."

Vestry Service at St. Mark & St. Paul (Fall 2024)

Vestry members serve three-year terms and must be out of office at least a year before standing for election to another full term.

The formal qualifications for Vestry members are :

- --Confirmed member in good standing of the Parish of St. Mark & St. Paul. (Clergy are enrolled members of their diocese, not a particular parish, and thus aren't eligible.)
- --At least 16 years of age
- --Regular in worship attendance
- --Have made and are fulfilling a pledge in the current year
- --Not an employee of St. Mark & St. Paul or another organization or institution of the Diocese of Tennessee
- --Complete a background check by the Diocese of Tennessee

Informal qualifications are important, as well:

- --Committed to the Christian life and ministry of this parish
- --Approach the work prayerfully
- --Work well in a group, listening openly and respectfully to points of view that differ from their own
- --Speak their minds straightforwardly during deliberations while supporting decisions the Vestry reaches as a whole

What do Vestry members do?

- --Complete "Safeguarding God's People" online training
- --Prepare for and attend monthly regular meetings and any called meetings

- --Stay up-to-date on parish communications
- --Participate in an annual retreat
- --Help envision the ministry and needs of the parish in the present and future
- --Be on duty about once a month for the early service and between services, or for the late service and after church.
- --Serve as a Teller (counter of offering) about once every two months
- --Act as chair of, or liaison to, a particular committee or ministry area
- --Adopt the annual parish budget and monitor parish finances
- --Deliberate and decide important issues in the life of the parish
- --Enjoy the privilege of serving the people of God at St. Mark & St. Paul

The **Nominating Committee** customarily consists of the Vestry members completing their terms and not eligible to run for 2025: Diane Jones, Lynn Stubblefield, and Beth Wiley. You may contact any member of the Nominating Committee to recommend yourself or someone else (with that person's permission).

Godly Play 1 introduces children ages 3-5 or 6 (through kindergarten) to the Godly Play spiritual practice. Children experience a story and reflect on it through wondering together, working with the story materials, or creating art. They share

prayer and a "feast" of apple slices or crackers. If there's time, they will go to the playground. Teachers are Wendy Prothro Howard, Aaron Elrod, Cara Kitzrow, Madeleine Leone, and Kenneth Woodford.

Godly Play 2 offers children in grades 1-3 an opportunity to learn enrichment lessons and go deeper into the story. The structure is the same as in Godly Play 1 – story, wondering, work, feast, maybe playground. Teachers include Babara Prunty, Cheryl Lankhaar, Jori Smith, Beth Wiley, and Jeannie Babb.

4th/5th Class takes children in grades 4 and 5 beyond Godly Play. They learn about Episcopal worship and structure, and go deeper into the stories with maps and further study. This class is led by Julia Bates, Jocelyn Snider, and Matthew Mitchell.

Centering Prayer is a method of silent prayer through which we consent to God's presence and action within us. Those who practice it do so not in place of corporate worship and service, but rather as a necessary complement to those modes of engaging with God and with our neighbor. Having a core of people in the parish who practice contemplative prayer makes a difference.

The Centering Prayer support group at St. Mark and St. Paul's continues to meet faithfully every Monday night. With chairs encircling a candle at the front of the nave, we have a brief check-in about our prayer practice and anything else going on in our lives, and then we have a meditation session (what we call a "sit") together. 

A Note from your Altar Guild

We wish to extend a warm welcome to our new parish members and a continued "thank you" to those who have been around a while.

The Altar Guild ministry is open to



everyone – including men, as you may have noticed in the weekly bulletin listing those serving each Sunday. Some families like to get involved and that is certainly encouraged. We like to utilize everyone's particular skills. Some like to polish brass/silver while some like to wash linens for the Eucharist. I personally like the satisfaction of seeing the altar setup for the service – everything in its place

and ready for the ministers to use during the service.

Like everything else, altar guild service is not for everyone. We welcome you to try it out for a month or two to see if it is as fulfilling for you as it is for those of us currently serving. We promise we will be there to walk you through everything and we utilize checklists, post photographs or diagrams of altar setups and provide manuals to help us all remember what to do.

What type of time commitment is involved? For our regular services we schedule 2 members a Sunday. They usually meet on Sat. morning to polish and get the vessels setup for Sunday. On Sunday morning, one person comes prior to the 8:30am service (around 8:00am) and sets out the prepared items. After that service both members clean what was used and resets for the 11:00am service. After that service the second member cleans and puts everything away. Of course there are special services such as funerals or seasonal services where we all pitch in according to our availability.
