
From the Rector: More Omicron (ugh!)

At this writing the most recent data available show new COVID cases in our county and state at their highest level ever and increasing sharply. Less than 10% of of regular and ICU hospital beds are available statewide. For these reasons we have held Christian Formation classes via Zoom only January 9, 16 & 13, and worship via Facebook or Zoom (but not in person) January 16 & 23.

For 2022 the Tennessee Department of Health has changed its policy on releasing COVID data. Instead of providing data through the previous day 5 days per week, they are now releasing data up through the previous Saturday once a week on Wednesday. This change makes it considerably more difficult to assess current COVID conditions. On Thursday each week I have been making a decision for the coming Sunday, and we announce it via email, Facebook, and the Sewanee Classifieds.

Whether worship is held in person and children's and youth classes take place indoors, outdoors, or a combination will be based on the weather and COVID conditions. If the situation warrants, we'll probably return the 11am service to outdoors once it is warm enough to do so in March.

I look forward eagerly to a day when such adaptations won't be urgently necessary. In the meantime, though, God is no less present and we are no less important to one another. I ask for your forbearance as we endure this trial, and your creativity to help us find ways to maintain and grow connections even as it is deeply challenging to do so.

Vestry Highlights

Highlights of Vestry meeting of December 16, 2021 (in Kennerly Hall)

- Adopted the 2022 operating budget.
- received an update on information received since the December meeting about an arrearage in pension contributions for former CAC Director Betty Carpenter.
- approved clergy housing allowance provisions for the Revs. Rob Lamborn and David Goodpaster.
- supplemented the work of the Stewardship Committee by writing thankyou notes to three 2022 pledgers each.
- enjoyed refreshments provided by Junior Warden Annette Smith.

- Elected Joel Cunningham as Senior Warden, Annette Smith as Junior Warden, and Alec Moseley as Treasurer for the coming year.
- Reviewed the duties of vestry service in relation to the mission of the church and diocesan canons.
- assembled vestry member responsibilities as outlined on the list of personnel in this newsletter.
- Authorized payment of half of a pension arrearage owed on former CAC Director Betty Carpenter's behalf, anticipating a proposal on how to pay for the 2nd half at its February regular meeting.

Diocesan Convention



Because of COVID, a reduced delegation consisting of Alex & Kathryn Bruce and Rob Lamborn participated in convention on the second day only at St. George's, Nashville, Saturday, January 22. In addition to holding hearings on resolutions and the budget, adopting the 2022 budget, listening to an address from Bp. Bauerschmidt, and worshiping together at the Holy Eucharist, hearing a report from the Episcopal School of Nashville, diocesan convention adopted two resolutions. The first implemented last year's requirement for antiracism training by establishing a curriculum clergy and Senior Wardens must participate in during

2022. The 2023 convention will consider next steps, likely adding Vestry member and lay employees to the requirement. The second resolution reminded the diocese of the 2018 General Convention resolution in opposition to the death penalty and called for the establishment of a diocesan task force as specified in the General Convention resolution. In that resolution we learned more about Abu-Ali Abdur'Rahman, a confirmed Episcopalian on Tennessee's Death Row for whom we have been praying for a few years. Mr. Abdur'Rahman, who has been involved in Education for Ministry while in prison, has had his sentence converted to life without parole. Next year's convention will be January 20-21 at St. David's, Nashville; please let Rob or a Vestry member know if you'd be interested in representing your parish there.



Roof Ridge Update

Replacement of the ridge of the church roof with a copper ridge cap to repair wind damage is now complete. The copper ridge cap will be tied into an upgraded lightning protection system. Many thanks to Mickey Suarez and Annette Smith for shepherding this process to completion!








Christian Formation News

Nursery News



Look for weekly emails regarding nursery hours. They may change from week to week depending on COVID numbers.

Our new Nursery Coordinator is Cara Kitzrow. Cara is an artist, naturalist, parent, and a Sewanee graduate local to the mountain. She and her two children spend their days exploring, playing, or working in the garden. Cara has worked as a Nursery Caregiver since 2019. She has also assisted with VB-Us; in 2021 she developed and implemented the children's program

for our fully outdoor program. Cara brings creativity and a peaceful spirit to all that she does.

We also have a new Nursery Caregiver, Emily True. Emily has worked in the nursery as a substitute all year, so the children already know and love her. Emily is a junior at the University majoring in Geology. She brings three summers of camp experience. Emily's interests revolve around the outdoors — camping, climbing, and kayaking — so she has been very much at home with our Covidinspired outdoor nursery! She also loves cooking and reading.

Diana Rung continues to serve as a substitute when Cara or Emily is out. We will be hiring more substitutes this month; please let Jeannie or Cara know if interested. Substitutes are usually scheduled for one Sunday per month and are available to work most other Sundays if needed. Church members may also choose to serve as backup volunteers. Volunteers and paid workers are subject to the same Safeguarding protocols.

Current nursery hours are 9:30 am to 12:00 noon. Nursery meets outdoors when the weather is nice; otherwise, downstairs in the first classroom. Anyone over 2 years old must wear a mask while indoors.

Godly Play





Godly Play 1 is for children who are at least three years old through first grade. Godly Play 2 is for children in grades 2-5. Children will meet in the Godly Play rooms for a story and wondering. Please bring children before 9:45 so the storyteller can begin! After the story and wondering, we will go outside for feast and play if weather allows. If it is too cold or raining, children will remain indoors for

an art reflection time, but will not have the feast.

Pick up children at 10:45 on the playground or in the rooms according to weather. In case of Covid-19 risk increase, we will meet via Zoom. The link is sent by email, so please make sure we have your information in Realm, the church's database.

During the season after Epiphany, children hear parables. Each year as they encounter the parables, the story may be the same but they hear it from a different perspective. The storyteller asks children questions like "I wonder if the birds have names?" or "I wonder what this place could really be?" Wondering about the parables often leads to amazing insights, for the storyteller as well as the children.


The Challenge of Growing a Church **Kathleen Sturgis, Parish Organist**
