In case of inclement weather, children will be taken into our new nursery room in the basement of the parish hall (in Sewanee Children's Center). Masks are required indoors.

Sunday, September 19: Speaker Julia Gatta. "Servant" and "Leader" are not naturally paired in our time nor were they in the time of Christ.
