From the Rector: Cautious Optimism

Since our last issue (when I titled my column “Not again!”) new COVID cases reached a spike in in our area and the state that rivaled the spike in late December last year. Widespread availability of the vaccine for those 12 and up this time meant that cases, hospitalizations, and deaths have been concentrated overwhelmingly among those not vaccinated. (I continue to lament how safety issues like masks and vaccinations have been politicized during this pandemic!).

Even though the vaccination rate in the parish among those eligible has been very high, we still increased our precautions because of breakthrough cases and out of a sense of responsibility to the broader community. All of our Christian Formation classes for minors currently take place outdoors, and we pray that safe vaccination will soon become widely available to those under 12 before the weather gets too cold.

I am grateful that cases have been declining rapidly from their mid-September peak. Although we have not yet reached the low numbers of this past spring

and early summer, the numbers are quickly moving in the right direction. Given this change, I am inviting those with speaking roles at indoor services to remove their masks for the time they are at the lectern so they can be heard more clearly. The first pew on the congregation's left will remain roped off to ensure adequate distance from speakers.

How will things look for Advent and Christmas? Stay tuned. Taking care for your health and that of your loved ones will continue to be our highest priority. Christian Formation Director Jeannie Babb is already considering possibilities for the Christmas Pageant. The one thing I've learned to be certain of during this pandemic is uncertainty! I commend to you this collect composed by the Youth Sunday School class on Sunday, September 5:

- Almighty God, who heals the sick, send your Son again to help us through the Covid-19 pandemic, so that we may gather to pray, sing, and worship in freedom without fear, through the healing power of your Son Jesus Christ. Amen.

Annual Parish Meeting and Vestry Elections

Sunday, November 21, at 9:45am

The Annual Parish Meeting is scheduled for November 22. At this meeting we will be electing three new members to the vestry. Under diocesan canons, "Confirmed Communicants in Good Standing in the Parish sixteen years of age or older may vote at a Parish Meeting, and no proxies shall be allowed." If COVID conditions warrant, we will provide the ability to vote to people who qualify but are not comfortable coming to the meeting in person this year.

Vestry nominations

Vestry members serve three-year terms and must be out of office at least a year before standing for election to another full term.

The formal qualifications for Vestry members are:

- Confirmed member in good standing of the Parish of St. Mark & St. Paul
- At least 16 years of age
- Regular in worship attendance
- Have made and are fulfilling a pledge in the current year

- Not an employee of St. Mark & St. Paul or another organization or institution of the Diocese of Tennessee
- Completion of a background check as required by the Diocese of Tennessee

Yet informal qualifications are important as well:

- Committed to the Christian life and ministry of this parish
- Approach the work prayerfully
- Work well in a group, listening openly and respectfully to points of view that differ from their own
- Speak their minds straightforwardly during deliberations while supporting decisions the Vestry reaches as a whole.

What do Vestry members do?

- Complete "Safeguarding God's People" online training
- Prepare for and attend monthly regular meetings, and any called meetings
- Participate in an annual retreat
- Help envision the ministry and needs of the parish in the present and future
- Serve as "Vestry of the Day" for a full Sunday morning about once every two months
- Serve as a Teller (counter of offering) about once every two months
- Act as chair of, or liaison to, a particular committee or ministry area
- Adopt the annual parish budget and monitor parish finances
- Deliberate and decide important issues in the life of the parish
- Enjoy the privilege of serving the people of God at St. Mark & St. Paul

The **Nominating Committee** consists of the 3 Vestry members completing their terms this year: Susan Holmes, Karen Meridith (convener), and Sue Moseley. You may contact any member of the Nominating Committee to recommend yourself or someone else (with that person's permission) no later than October 31.


Outdoor Nursery

We still have room for more children! We are currently operating completely outdoors, using spaces such as the playground, porches, lawn, and quad. Tuesday Morning is a wonderful weekly event for preschoolers, and a chance for parents and caregivers to have a break. The emphasis on Godly Play distinguishes the program from other playgroups or co-ops. Godly Play is an imaginative, Montessori-based approach to nurturing the Christian faith. Using symbols and objects as well as words, Godly Play stories value openness and discovery rather than rewarding correct answers. The culture of the Godly Play room encourages generosity and calm. We also spend time outdoors on the playground, engaged in art and other work, and playing cooperative games like Red Light, Green Light and Ring-around-the-Rosie that help children learn cooperation, listening, and following instructions.

Thanks to the generosity of the church's pledging members, Tuesday morning Godly Play / Parents' Morning Out is offered at no cost to families. Parents take turns volunteering several times per semester. Parents who wish to enroll a child in the program should register here:

All of this takes place at the Parish of St. Mark & St. Paul. Childcare provided upon request.

The Commuter Core model covers the same essential training as our Core Training for all Godly Play teachers in the Godly Play room, but takes place during three separate Saturday modules. You will learn the processes and Core stories of Godly Play as well as the theology behind these practices. Modules may be attended in any order, over time and location. Participants may build credit toward Core Training certification, which is awarded after completion of all three modules. This model underscores the action/reflection aspect of Godly Play training by allowing participants new experiences between training dates, which they then bring with them to the next Commuter Core module.

Registration closes the Monday before Training. We'd love to have you in the circle!

The Godly Play Foundation requires participants at in-person events to be vaccinated for COVID (unless there is a medical reason why you cannot be). You will also be required to wear a mask indoors, with the exception of meals. All participants will be asked to sign this [waiver](#). We will be monitoring local COVID numbers and CDC recommendations, and will notify participants within a week of the start of the training if any changes to dates or protocols need to be made.

Youth Sunday School

JUST A GLIMPSE AT ST. MARK By Kathleen Sturgis

Recently our Forum presentation on St. Mark was done by Fr. Peter Gray. Many of the things he outlined about St. Mark encouraged me to look further into the ministry of St. Mark and what we might learn from him. So, I did some reading. St. Mark was born in Jerusalem. They think he died in Alexandria, Egypt where he is said to have founded that seat of Christianity. There are two feast days for Mark. The west acknowledges April 25th, while the east uses September 23rd. Mark, Mathew and Luke are the writers of the Synoptic Gospels. They each tell the story of Jesus' life, ministry, passion and resurrection. However, each is from a slightly different perspective. Mark's Gospel is the shortest and earliest written. (Before the destruction of Jerusalem in 70 AD). Matthew used 90% of Mark's material in his gospel and Luke used 50 % in writing his. Mark's style is simple and direct. It is probably written for the Roman converts to understand Jewish tradition in the telling of the ministry of Jesus.

Tradition assumes Mark was one of the 72 disciples appointed by Jesus in Luke 10:1 and identifies him as fleeing at the arrest of Jesus (Mark 14:51 -52). His name was John (Acts 12:25; 15), but he used his Latin name of Mark. He did travel with Paul and Barnabas on missions until there was a breach between he and Paul. Then they separated and Mark and Barnabas went to Jerusalem and then to Cyprus. There was now a second chance with Paul it seems, whatever that breach entailed.

The Egyptian Church claims St. Mark as its founder from the 4th Century AD. Alexandria was called the "cathedra Marci: (the chair of Mark). The cities of Aquileia and Venice were also attributed to Mark. In fact, Mark is the patron saint of Venice. The cathedral is named for him as is the piazza in front of it.

What makes the Gospel of Mark distinct? Jesus is reluctant to reveal himself as the Messiah throughout the Gospel of Mark. Jesus refers to himself as the “Son of Man”. However, his mighty deeds outlined in the Gospel were so momentous, people couldn’t help but tell of his greatness. So, what can we learn from Mark? Probably that when you know the joy of Jesus, it is pretty hard to keep it to yourself. Now that we know he is the Messiah, I think Jesus and St. Mark would be O.K. with us “telling the story “of His greatness.


